## A-G Missed Areas

Approximately $40 \%$ of graduates during the 2018-2021 school years failed to meet at least 1 of the A-G requirement areas.

Nearly $1 / 3$ rd of all graduates missed the English portion of the A-G requirement.


## Percentage of Students Missing A -G Areas

Focusing specifically on the population of students who were unsuccessful in completing at least one A -G area:

Nearly 80\% did not complete English.

This was followed by Lab Science and Mathematics

## Unfulfilled A -G Requirements: Centering Black Students



Approximately 50\% of all African American Students are missing at least 1 Area of A-G.

In contrast, this figure is $38 \%$ for students from other racial/ethnic groups

While African American Students comprise 13\%of student enrollment in LBUSD for th is time period, they represent approximately $\mathbf{1 7 \%} \%$ of students missing A-G status

## A-G Requirements: Number of Areas Not Met



Over 50\% of LBUSD students who failed to meet A-G requirements did so for more than 2 areas

## English Learners

Students who were classified as Current English Learners failed to meet A-G requirements at a significantly greater rate than other students. In contrast to this, the rate at which

Former EL students missed A-G requirements was observed to be similar to the district average.


## Missed English Sub Area

Analysis was conducted on students who failed to meet 1-2 A-G areas. The results of this initial analysis show that $63 \%$ of students who fail to meet A-G do so for English

Further exploration was conducted as to the courses which acted as the most significant barrier to the English portion of A-G.

Results show that nearly half of these students who missed the English portion did so for English 12
